As the 1976 Olympics neared it became necessary to prepare and issue a series commemorating this occasion. Since supplies of all regular issue values were adequate the Canadian Bank Note company proceeded with printing. The Canadian Bank note company did not create a new prefix group for use with the olympic issue but continued with the prefixes from the regular issue as shown below. Note also that the prefix IN is not used.

THIRD RUN

Upon completion of the olympic series the Canadian Bank note company was ready to resume printing of the regular issue store coupons. By this time supplies of some values had either run out or were running low. The only values required in this run were the 10 cent, 5 cent and 25 cent values. The prefix PN was assigned to the 10 cent, QN to the 5 cent and RN to the 25 cent value. (Fig 3)
