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FOURTH RUN

The next values to run low were again the 10 cent and 5 cent values. In this run the prefix SN was assigned to the 10 cent and TN to the 5 cent value. (Fig 4) The stores must have been issuing and running out of these values quickly.

FIFTH RUN

The next values required were the 10, 25 and the 3 cents. The prefix UN was assigned to the 10 cent, WN to the 25 cent and XN to the 3 cent value. (Fig 5) The prefix VN was not used.

SIXTH RUN

The last requirement in this series was another printing of the 10 cent and 50 cent values. The prefix YN was assigned to the 10 cent value and ZN to the 50 cent value. (Fig 6)

This completes the order in which the first prefix group was run by the Canadian bank note company. The prefixes AN to ZN were all used except IN and VN. Prefixes JN to ON were used on the olympic issue.
